CLOWN


Kill me the red bumble-bee on the top of the thistle yonder, and bring me the honey-bag.

QUEEN TITANIA [Sends a fairy to give the Indian boy to King Oberon and falls asleep]



Speak not you for him; he's a traitor.



LEONTES







My father had a mole upon his brow.





O, God defend me! how am I beset!





Enter CYMBELINE

LEONATUS Alack, the king!

CYMBELINE

Thou basest thing, avoid! hence, from my sight! If after this command thou fraught the court With thy unworthiness, thou diest: away! Thou'rt poison to my blood.

LEONATUS

The gods protect you! And bless the good remainders of the court! I am gone.

[Banished from Britain by Cymbeline, Leonatus exits and unwillingly abandons his wife, Imogen.]

DESCRIPTION OF CHARACTERS

Iachimo, Italian noble from Rome, wagered Leonatus he could convince Imogen to be untrue Leonatus, Banished from Britain, wagered his diamond ring wife Imogen would remain true

ACT II SCENE IV. An Italian noble's house in Rome

LEONATUS

I hope the briefness of your answer made The speediness of your return.

IACHIMO

Your lady Is one of the fairest that I have look'd upon.

LEONATUS

All is well yet. Sparkles this stone as it was wont? or is't not Too dull for your good wearing?

IACHIMO

I'll make a journey twice as far, to enjoy A second night of such sweet shortness which Was mine in Britain, for the ring is won.

LEONATUS

The stone's too hard to come by.

IACHIMO [Showing the bracelet]







As good to wink, sweet love, as look on night.

LUCIANA

Why call you me love? call my sister so.

ANTIPHOLUS OF SYRACUSE

Call thyself sister, sweet, for I am thee. Thee will I love and with thee lead my life.

DESCRIPTION OF CHARACTERS

Angelo, A goldsmith who gave a gold chain to Antipholus of Syracuse, believing it to be his twin, Antipholus of Ephesus







BASSANIO





KATHARINA


I pray you, husband, be not so disquiet: The meat was well, if you were so contented.

PETRUCHIO


